Rob Huth is Speaker of the Year 2017

The combined Annual Dinner and final of the Arthur Garvey Speaker of the Year competition is often described as Rostrum WA's 'premier event' and 2017 was no exception. Just over 100 members and guests gathered on 18 November at the Karrinyup Country Club to catch up with one another over a meal, celebrate another Rostrum year and support the AGSOY finalists. MC Ryan Whiddett (Club 15) directed proceedings through a busy agenda.

The final of the AGSOY competition was, as always, the highlight of the evening with the five speakers entertaining the audience on topics they were clearly very passionate about. A sixth finalist, Frank Marshall (Club 34), unfortunately became ill the day before the final and was unable to participate.

Rob Huth from Club 19 won the title of Speaker of the Year, the Arthur Garvey trophy and \$500 for his speech *Over the Hill*, in which he asked why people over 60 are not valued in the workforce and most Australians have retired by age 65. He spoke about elder wisdom in indigenous communities, business, and literature to highlight that wisdom is not degraded by age.

Rachel Ashton from Southern Star Club 63 in Albany won the Runner-up trophy and \$250 for *Strange but True*. She explored the ideas of reincarnation and the butterfly effect, suggesting that everything happens for a reason.

Strange but True was also the topic chosen by Jean-Marc Papineau (Club 5). Using himself, Thomas Edison and James Dyson as examples, he explained that you often have to fail in order to succeed. In an entertaining speech titled Sheer Stupidity, Amanda Meloni (Club 5) revealed that 'stupidity' started with a boy, it was a 'stupid idea' to attempt to win him back after being dumped, and 'sheer stupidity' not to learn from her mistakes. Jacinth Watson (Club 15) spoke on I've had Enough, three little words that can prompt someone to change their life. She told three stories about life-changing events and stressed the importance of three other little words 'Are you OK?' in potentially saving a life.

Nadia Truong, 2016 AGSOY winner, gave the Rostrum Toast at the start of the evening. She encouraged members to take their Rostrum Promise seriously by not being silent when they ought to speak, unlike her silence when she was a teenager in school which earned herself and her whole class a detention.

Freeman Sue Hart presented her last President's Address at an AGSOY final, commenting on how encouraging it was to see almost all the clubs represented. She spoke about some of the year's highlights and invited everyone to attend the upcoming celebrations for the 70th Anniversary of Rostrum WA on 28 July 2018.

There haven't been many presentations at the Annual Dinner recently so it was nice to see some members recognised on the night. Sue presented Bronze Medallions to Ivan Miles (Club 11) and Patricia Watts (Club 19). Ivan was recognised for his efforts in promoting both his club and the organisation for more than 30 years. Patricia organised the AGSOY competition and Annual Dinner in 2016, the Sidney Wicks competition in 2017, and is currently planning the 70th Anniversary celebrations and ARC conference for 2018.

The presentations continued with Freeman Bill Smith, Chairman of Freeman's Council, announcing – to their complete surprise – the elevation of two new Freemen, Rob Gates (Club 19) and Rose Fogliani (Club 15).

Club 19 was awarded the year's R Alan Crook Award for the Club of Excellence for the second year in a row. The club has continued to grow and prosper, introducing many new members to the benefits of Rostrum and public speaking. Well done – Freeman, Bronze Medallion and the gong!

Congratulations to Rob and Rachel on their achievement, and to all the finalists for being part of the competition. A HUGE thankyou to the Adjudicators – Freeman Ruurd Speelman (Chairman), Freeman Ken Holzman, Freeman Wayne Passmore, Carmel Philippe and Joanna Whitney for their expertise. 

During the last week of November, when the majority of Rostrum clubs were powering down after a busy year at the podium, a handful of members were just gearing up for their Critics' Training Course. Karen Cooper, Alex Cokic and Lauren O'Neill (all from Club 19); Priscilla Nguyen (Club 33); Pamela Marcano and Roy Sainsbury (both from Club 50) and Rachel Ashton (Club 63) attended the course on 25 November and 9 December at the Wembley Community Centre. The course also attracted a visitor to Rostrum, Rosemary Robertson.

Under the guidance of Director of Training Ruurd Speelman, and with assistance from trainers Rob Gates, Don Duck, Wayne Passmore, David Price, Ken Holzman, Joanna Whitney, Ben Riley and Rosemary Robertson, the participants learnt what was expected from a Critic/Tutor/Coach in a Rostrum meeting, and what they needed to look for in speakers' presentations. Then came the opportunity to put theory into practice – the participants gave critiques of speeches, readings aloud, impromptu answers, and other speaking exercises from a typical Rostrum meeting, and received feedback from the trainers on their performance and where they could improve.

Freeman Ruurd Speelman commented at the conclusion of the course '... it is quite special to have all starters finish both days. They were all very keen and really tried hard.'

The participants are expected to further develop their skills by practising as Trainee Critics in their own clubs until they are ready to apply for formal accreditation.

The Critics' Training Course is run periodically depending on demand, and is open to any member who has completed the Personal Development Programme. If you are eligible and would like to attend a course, please register your interest with Deb at the RIC.

Special Delivery North Pole Annual Report

The usual large flamboyant typeface associated with the Season's Greetings has been downsized this year commensurate with the trend toward corporate downsizing.

The recent announcement that Donner and Blitzen have elected to take the early reindeer retirement package has triggered a good deal of concern about whether they will be replaced, and about other restructuring decisions at the North Pole.

Streamlining was appropriate in view of the reality that the North Pole no longer dominates the season's gift distribution business. E-commerce and mail order catalogues have diminished Santa's market share and he could not sit idly by and permit further erosion of the profit picture.

I am pleased to inform you that Rudolph's role will not be disturbed. Tradition still counts for something. Calling Rudolph 'a lush who was into the sauce and never did pull his share of the load' was an unfortunate comment, made by one of Santa's helpers and taken out of context at a time of year when he is known to be under executive stress.

As a further restructuring, today's global challenges require the North Pole to continue to look for better, more competitive steps. Effective immediately, the following economy measures are to take place in the 'Twelve Days of Christmas' subsidiary:

- The partridge will be retained, but the pear tree never turned out to be the cash crop forecasted. It will be replaced by a plastic hanging plant, providing considerable savings in maintenance.
- The two turtle doves are simply not cost effective.
 In addition, their romance during working hours could not be condoned. The positions are therefore eliminated.
- The four calling birds were replaced by an automated voice mail system, with a call waiting option. An analysis is underway to determine who the birds have been calling, how often and how long they talked.
- The Board of Directors has put the five golden rings on hold. Maintaining a portfolio based on one

- Eleven pipers piping and twelve drummers drumming is a simple case of the band getting too big. A substitution with a string quartet, a cutback on new music and no uniforms will produce savings, which will drop right down to the bottom line.

We can expect a substantial reduction in assorted people, fowl, animals and other expenses. Though incomplete, studies indicate that stretching deliveries over twelve days is inefficient. If we can instigate the 'Just in Time' principle, service levels will be improved.

Lastly, it is not beyond consideration that deeper cuts may be necessary in the future to stay competitive; should that happen, the Board would request Management to scrutinise the Snow White Division to see if seven dwarves is the right number.
