Name change and Adoption of new Rules

A Special General Meeting was held on Monday, December 3rd to consider two special resolutions.

34 people attended the meeting in person including all members of the RMC (Rostrum Management Committee). Members from 8 clubs were physically present - 61% of the clubs. Every other club was represented by at least one proxy so every club in the Zone was represented in the vote in some way.

Proxies were received from 64 members from 8 clubs. Together with proxies, that gave us a total of 98 votes - exactly 50% of the total membership.



The results were:

To change the name to Rostrum Clubs of WA - 96.9% in favour, 2 against, 1 abstention, - motion carried.

Adoption of the new Rules - 100% in favour - no abstentions - motion carried unanimously.

This is a very strong result and certainly provides a strong foundation and vote of confidence for the work the Reinvention Team has been doing during 2018.

The new Rules were lodged with the relevant government department on December 4th.

Constitutional Club 1 won the 2018 R Alan Crook Award

Saturday 24th November 2018, at the final of the Arthur Garvey Speaker of the Year AGSOY, the Constitutional Club 1 was named Rostrum WA Club of The Year 2018.

Club 1 fully met the judging criteria to win the prestigious award, as in the past year, the Constitutional Club 1 was judged to have made significant changes by consolidating the Club under the Club 1 name while ensuring its continuity, boosting membership, developing new programs and undertaking many initiatives to promote Rostrum through its community and a wider public.

Below are some of the highlights of the Club's achievements:

Firstly, we sought directions and guidance from the Rostrum Management Council to amalgamate our three clubs (Clubs 1 and 2, 28 and 33) to form the new Constitutional Club 1. This was also a way to revitalise these formerly active clubs into a larger entity in its own right, consistent with Rostrum's Reinvention initiative and to honour the 70th anniversary of Rostrum Clubs in Western Australia.

We chose the sub-name "The Constitutional Club" to reflect our meeting venue at the Constitutional Centre in West Perth and appreciate the synergy of "Constitutional" with the Rostrum WA Constitution that underpins Rostrum in this State and that Club 1 is the founding club.

Over the period of judging, we inducted seven new members.

We also conducted many exciting and interesting meetings through innovative contents and this encouraged members to undertake and complete personal development programs.

We also undertook other exciting initiatives to provide additional learning opportunities for members at our weekly meetings. We offered these opportunities to all members in the Rostrum community. The two 'speech and voice" sessions run by an external professional speech and voice trainer – Donald Woodburn from WAAPA (see picture) – attracted attendance and interest among members and the community and these sessions were well received. Donald taught us how to use our voice to connect and influence the audience; in other words, as an alternative formula to improve our public speaking skills and confidence.

We also took an initiative to promote Rostrum in general. An example of this was how we reached out to the community in the West Perth-Subiaco area, with the publication of an article in the Subiaco Post, which featured Myia Cleggett being awarded winner of Club 1's 2017 Speaker of the Year Competition.

Myia was a worthy winner of the award. She is an Expert Master Clinical Hypnotherapist and an example of the broadened spectrum of new members who have come to Club 1 to enhance their public speaking skills and confidence as a way to advance their profession.

In addition, Club 1 have always shown strong support for Rostrum activities, particularly the AGSOY events. This year, Club 1 entered 6 members in the 2018 AGSOY competition and had a strong attendance

at 70th Rostrum WA anniversary dinner.

Considering all the above and other recent activities within the Club, long-term coach Greg Swensen

encouraged the Club to enter into the R. Alan Crook Award for being the best club of the year. The President of Club 1 then took the lead to compile the application and its winning content was a team effort by all members.



We celebrated this achievement at our last fun meeting of the year on 27 November 2018 with a light lunch. The Christmas meeting featured impromptu speeches, with topics and mystery objects drawn out of the Christmas Gift box, which enabled members to deliver entertaining and imaginative made-up stories.

At this final meeting for 2018, a number of members received special commendations from the President, including Ito Makito for the most improved speaker (see picture) and Johanna Notley, who was the Club's 2018 Speaker of The Year winner (see picture). Vale

Dave Williams became a member of Rostrum Club 14, Geraldton at its inaugural meeting on the 5th of October 1974, he missed the first expression of interest meeting, but was a regular attender from then on. Rostrum quickly became a large part of his life, the friendship and fellowship across the state continued until his passing.

He fulfilled many executive positions in his early membership, being the Club Secretary for the 300th meeting. Shortly afterwards he was appointed the Club's Dais representative where he found his Rostrum niche. He served as Club 14's representative for 21 years, alerting other clubs of our differing views and news and delivering fulsome reports to the Club of Dais' deliberations. He was a critic/ coach and gave an interesting perspective on our efforts as Rostrum presenters. Dave became a Freeman in May 1990, and served as Dais Vice President in 1991 and 1992, travelling to Perth for many of the Dais Executive meetings, and accompanying Dais President Geoff Jones, by bus, to Broome to elevate their club. Dave was awarded a Bronze Medallion on the 30th of October 2004 for long time service to Club 14

Dave travelled with many members of Club 14 to assist Club 40 in Carnarvon to re-establish. He was also instrumental in getting Club 51 in Dongara running, attending many of their meetings as a coach or doing various presentations at their meetings. He was one of the members who presented to the Eneabba Progress Association about Rostrum and its ideals. He

travelled to England twice and made a point of visiting Rostrum's Yew tree birth place.

Dave was born in Albany, the eldest of five boys and one girl. He attended primary school in Albany and then went to New Norcia Agricultural School as a boarder. On completion of his schooling he obtained a position with one of Albany's bigger building companies, Zimmer and Wildy, as an apprentice carpenter. The majority of his apprenticeship was in the joiner's shop, and he became a very skilled cabinetmaker/joiner.

A lot of his leisure time was spent at the Princess Royal Yacht Club where he sailed VJ yachts to the stage where he competed in State Titles. In 1954 the Albany Surf Club was reformed, and although Dave was never a strong swimmer he became a member and participated in their activities.

He met Judy, who became his wife, through his mother, who was Judy's mother's best friend. When Judy's family was transferred to Perth, block release trips to Mt. Lawley School Technical allowed courtship to continue to flourish. Mt Lawley Technical College, not only allowed a long range courtship to prosper, but the College awarded him Apprentice of the Year in his first year. They married in April 1963, and Dave started working for Wesfarmers assembling precut rural homes over large parts of Western Australia, where he worked with all building trades and becoming competent in many of them. He and Judy also took on the management of the Greenough River Caravan Park, which with

Dave's construction time away meant Judy did a lot of park management. During this time Dave built a house for his family which grew when two daughters, Lee and Kerry were born. Completion of his building time with Wesfarmers and park management saw Dave begin a thriving renovation and cabinet making career, which he continued for the rest of his life.

Timber was another passion in Dave's life; Club 14 heard many stories of wood and its many interactions with Dave's life. He ended up with a large collection of many types of timber, some rare and valuable. A collection that he often referred to as his superannuation. A memorial service for Dave was held at the Geraldton Golf Club on the 25th of September, and Dave's family wished Rostrum Club 14 to conduct the celebration of his life. An honour that the Club did their

As Cheryl has said, Rostrum Club 39 has been good for Cheryl and having Cheryl is good for the Club! Cheryl has told her story in a recent speech to the Club entitled 'Hopes and Dreams', a condensed version of which follows.

Hopes & Dreams

I became a member of Rostrum on the 13th March 2018. My reason for joining Rostrum was to improve my public speaking skills and with a goal towards starting my own public speaking/disability awareness business.

The Rostrum Club I have joined is Club 39 in the Swan Midland Region. I am a mature lady with a disability. I have found Rostrum to be very inclusive and supportive and it is a good opportunity for me to gain the confidence I need to educate the wider community and raise awareness about people with a disability.

Rostrum has guided and supported me to build my confidence and learn how to function in formal meeting circumstances and to speak with more confidence than I had.

Earlier this month I was asked to give a media interview: whilst nervous, I drew on the skills I had learned through Rostrum and gave a speech.

I think Rostrum is a good opportunity for all people but especially those with challenges because it is safe and supportive environment for building selfconfidence and giving people their voices.

Club 39 for me has been a safe and encouraging place to express myself. Despite its small numbers it is a very energetic club. I have only been a member for a very short time but have already accomplished several steps in the Personal Development Program, I have so far passed 8 out of the 12 steps. Rostrum is a stepping stone for me to have the skills to have a successful business in the future.

I hope that this article may inspire others to find the value of Rostrum and like me have a go.
